Police urge exterior night light use

To increase safety, reduce crime, and make residents feel more secure, the South Orange Police Department encourages residents to leave exterior lighting on at night.

Good lighting deters criminals because they don't want to be seen or identified. Effective exterior lighting should allow 100 feet of visibility and should be bright enough to identify colors.

Leaving garage or porch lights on all day is a dead giveaway that you are out of town. Exterior lighting on a timer establishes a routine and the appearance of steady occupancy.

Use security lights with infrared motion sensors as an inexpensive substitute for an exterior porch light or side door light. ▲

Nonbinding referendum questions to appear on November ballot

Local opinion gauged on charter changes

Three nonbinding referendum questions will appear on the November general election ballot to gauge resident opinion on Village Charter changes:

■ Question 1: Should the Village Charter be amended to change the name of our municipality from the "Township of South Orange Village" to "South Orange Village"?

Explanation - The name was previously changed to include "Township" to bring eligibility for certain federal assistance. Eligibility no longer depends on the township designation.

■ Question 2: Should the Village Charter be amended to change the title of the "Village President" to "Mayor," the title of the "Board of Trustees" to "Village Council," and the title of "Trustee" to "Council member"?

Explanation - Unlike most other municipalities, South Orange's chief executive is called the "Village President," the governing body is called the "Board of Trustees," and its members are "Trustees."

■ Question 3: Should the Village Charter be amended to provide the Village President an annual stipend of \$2,400, without other benefits, and provide Village Trustees with an

annual stipend of \$1,800 each, without other benefits?

Explanation - Currently the Village President and Trustees receive no salary, other compensation, or benefits. A "yes" vote would provide the stipends with no additional benefits.

In addition to the ballot questions, the Board of Trustees may consider other proposed charter revisions, including: (1) changing biennial municipal elections from May to November; (2) changing the way board resolutions are adopted, to require a majority affirmative vote of Trustees present, not just Trustees who voted; and (3) allowing the Village President the right to vote on adoption of the municipal budget.

The additional questions will not appear on the November ballot, but the Board of Trustees welcomes resident input. E-mail your thoughts to charter@southorange.org, or mail to the Village Clerk.

Since South Orange government operates under a special state charter, changes proposed by the Board of Trustees must be adopted by ordinance, then approved by the State Legislature. ▲

Attendance stays level at SOPAC

SOPAC's fifth season of performing arts attracted attendance by more than 30,000 patrons in the year ending June 30, 2011, about the same as the prior year. The arts center's most recent quarterly report to the Village Trustees includes an impressive list of accomplishments: 32 SOPAC presentations, 6 school performances, and 26 presentations by Seton Hall and theater renters.

Forecasted in the coming year is an arts festival coinciding with the annual Celebrate South Orange event in June. SOPAC received its first N.J. State Council on the Arts grant to support the festival.

Also new is a redesigned membership program that gives discounts to South Orange and Maplewood residents who join SOPAC. The memberships are available online or at the box office.

For kids, a five-part Kids & Family Series and a School Time Series is planned from now through May. Literature, history, science and more will come to life through staged performance.

MSSO gets anti-cigarette litter grant

Staff and volunteers of Main Street South Orange have been picking up and counting cigarette butts in and around the train station. That's because MSSO received a grant from the Keep America Beautiful campaign to clean up cigarette litter in a targeted area. The grant requires three cigarette litter scans and butt pick-ups, one before and two after the campaign.

MSSO purchased three cigarette butt receptacles for the train station, and personal ashtrays are being given to commuters. Follow-up scans will determine whether the measures have any impact.

Smokers are urged too look for the nearest train station receptacle (there are seven of them) to deposit butts. Let's grow pride in our community and keep it litter free! ▲



STEVEN HOLLOW

December Villager of the Month

"If we're not doing the best we can for the next generation, we're cheating ourselves," says Steven Hollow.

Luckily, for South Orange and all of New Jersey, Hollow is willing to buck up the eager beavers and banish the bullies.

His method? The arts.

Hollow is a distinguished teaching artist with the New Jersey State Council on the Arts and the 2004 recipient of the Governor's Award for Arts Education. He has been a visiting faculty member for the North Carolina School of the Arts and Long Island University; an outreach artist for the Jamaica Center for Arts and Learning; and an arts consultant to the New York City Board of Education.

All that said, Hollow is also very human.

"I was a short fat Jewish kid. I understood being a target, but I never knew how truly devastating it was for some kids, how it could effect their whole lives."

He learned the facts working for the Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities project starting in 2007. As the northern region manager for the Rutgers-based program, Hollow was hired to use his creativity to help schools districts make better decisions about program selection and general spending.

"We were teaching what was effective and what was not," he said.

At the time, "bullying issues started raising their heads." Hollow and team dug in to see which districts had related policies and what they covered. Many had anti-bullying policies but weren't using them. "We started going into schools and teaching the staff what they should be doing to make their policies work."

SADFS lost funding this year, but not before Hollow put it in "extracurricular" time with the Municipal Alliance in Maplewood.

"I was doing it outside of work,

but it was part of what I did. It wasn't volunteerism, just extra. I've always done extra," he says. "The jobs I do don't run 9 to 5."

That's also true of Hollow's video skills. He often teaches public speaking with a theatrical bent to business people who need to improve their oral and PowerPoint presentations. Those skills have been a boon to SOMACOM-TV where Hollow volunteers producing videos.

At Rutgers, administrators wanted to produce six videos on SADFS training. Instead of letting them hire an outside studio, Hollow raised his hand to do the editing and graphics on six instructional videos, including one on anti-bullying. It wasn't exactly volunteerism, but it wasn't his job either.

Locally, Hollow is known for running the Penny Pretzel Playhouse, a puppet theater that delighted local families for years before it was stricken by budget problems. He's also a frequent storyteller at Marshall School where his son Jordon, now in middle school, once attended. "They still call me," says Hollow.

"It's a lot of fun."

When Hollow and his wife Michele moved to South Orange

in 1991, he heard about the annual First Night celebration and called the organizers. His theater contacts got him an invitation to the board and he has remained for 18 years with undiminished enthusiasm.

That first year, Hollow delivered performers from Big Apple Circus in New York. "The gym was exploding," he remembers. "We were watching everyone laugh and be amazed by what we brought to such a small space. It was just a lot of fun."

For Steven Hollow, a fulfilling life really *is* about the next generation. "We've got to get it right," he says. "We can screw up a lot of things, but that's not one of them. It's too high a price to pay for failure." ▲
