Help is here for S.O.'s Gutsiest Students

When Villager Henderson Fleming graduated from Columbia High in 2002, he knew he wanted to be a mechanic, but tuition at Engine City Technical School in Scotch Plains was \$17,000.

He applied for a scholarship from the Columbia High School Scholarship Fund, a community nonprofit that helps motivated students whose families often survive on incomes in the mid to high teens.

Knowing that most CHSSF scholarships are \$1,000, Henderson was grateful to be offered \$1,500, but he had no other resources. He found a job, researched student loans, and through sheer determination, raised nearly all of the remaining goal. Then he returned to CHSSF, which upped the scholarship to \$2,000, and later tacked on \$1,000 for specialized tools.

Today, Henderson is a fully certified diesel mechanic in Newark who maintains ties with his friends at CHSSF. He is one of an average 47 South Orange and Maplewood students who are aided each year by the all-volunteer organization.

Now the fund needs your help. The ever-increasing

applicant pool and rising costs of higher education demand ongoing fundraising.


"These kids have dire financial need," said Vice President Brigid Casey. "They're good kids who want to succeed and they're highly motivated," often the first person in the family to aspire beyond a high school education.

Scholarships are awarded based on an applicant's financial need, likely ability to succeed at the selected school, and evidence of

personal responsibility, such as educational savings from after-school or summer jobs.

The usual scholarship of \$1,000 per year may be used at any trade or technical school, two- or four-year college, and even graduate school. Any CHS senior or graduate may apply, and reapply, as long as they are enrolled in higher education.



South Orange Performing Arts Center (SOPAC)

SOPAC is coming! Foundations are finished and pre-cast, west and north walls have been erected, and the steel structure is complete. The building should be enclosed before winter.

Clearview Cinema has signed an agreement to manage the movies and Seton Hall will use the stage part time. A fall 2006 opening is planned.

The 34,840-square-foot, four-level structure is situated on 17,512 square feet of land in the New Jersey Transit commuter parking lot behind the train station. It will contain five movie theaters with a total of 600 seats, a 415-seat performance theater with a balcony, and a multi-purpose room that can be used for community events, such as a catering hall or rehearsal space.

Irvington Avenue

The make-over of Irvington Avenue is almost complete. PSE&G has installed new electrified gas lights from South Orange Avenue to the Maplewood border. New sidewalks and plantings are completed in the commercial districts and the new mini-park, next to the parking lot is done.

Irvington Avenue is the Village's secondary business district, featuring small family businesses and shops between Prospect Street and the Maplewood border. Its make-over includes a new streetscape featuring extensive landscaping, and blue-stone brick pavers. Businesses on the street have been given incentives to participate in facade improvements.

Beifus Mercedes

9 West South Orange Ave.

Construction is underway on the four-story building at the former Mercedes auto dealership. The project will include 53 luxury apartments, 9,896 square feet of retail space and parking for both shoppers and condominium owners.

The site includes the original auto

dealership and the former Music Lovers building. Site owner Andrew Beifus was selected as the developer in summer 2001. His plan application was approved by the Planning Board in December 2002. Both the Beifus and Music Lovers buildings were demolished in May 2003. Mr. Beifus applied for and was granted an amended site plan in January 2005.

New Market

South Orange & Vose Avenues

Remaining tenants in the Vose Avenue building have vacated so that demolition can begin as soon as Verizon completes relocation of phone lines. The long-anticipated project will contain a 13,500-square-foot gourmet market and 1,500 square feet of retail space at ground level near the South Orange train station. A contract has been signed with a supermarket operator, John Choi.

The Vose Avenue portion of the project includes ground floor retail space and 80 for-sale luxury condominium units. Sterling Properties and South Mountain Development Company are the development team. The Village is finalizing sale of the properties and a developer's agreement has been signed by all parties.

Saiyd Plaza

110-116 West South Orange Ave.

The old oriental rug store building was demolished to make way for a new building and plans were approved by the Village Planning Board. The owner has now purchased additional properties and plans to submit revised plans for a building that will extend from the Reservoir restaurant building to Church Street, with retail space on the ground level, apartments above, and parking in the rear.

This is a private project for a site located within the redevelopment zone. The developer/owner received site plan approval from the Planning Board in October 2002 and preliminary approval for a revised plan in November 2004. He must submit revised plans for the expanded building.
